Program overview and objectives

To secure your room at the Mountain Lodge Conference Center, please call 877-441-4386 and state that you will be attending the Cardiovascular Conference at Snowshoe program—Reservations Group Number 51F06A; two plus nights are required to receive the following room rates. At Mountain Lodge (conference location),

the room rate is \$210 per night for a one-bedroom suite with kitchen and \$338 per night for a two-bedroom suite with kitchen.
